

### From the Organ Bench

During this Holy season of Lent, you may have noticed that we have refrained from hearing the organ being played during the traditional "prelude" time before the service. However, on this Laetare Sunday, we are allowed a moment during the Lenten season to think about the promise of Easter and can "rejoice" as is stated in Isaiah 66:10.

Kenneth Leighton (1929-1988) was a prolific Englishman who penned numerous works for the church. His organ Fantasy on the familiar hymn tune begins softly and gradually builds in complexity and strength until reaching a brilliant conclusion - indeed a joyfully declaration to The King of Love!

Ralph Vaughan Williams (1872-1958), like his fellow countryman Leighton, composed a wealth of choral music during his prolific career. Having served in the British Army during World War I and having lived through the horrors of World War II, Vaughan Williams personally felt the gravitas of these world conflicts, yet his ethereal anthem "O Taste and See" contains none of the "gloom" or "melancholy" one might associate with his symphonic compositions.

The offertory motet "Locus iste," or "This place was made by God," was written by Anton Brucker (1824-1896) for the dedication of the votive chapel at the Catholic Cathedral of the Immaculate Conception in Linz, Austria.

Today's postlude will be played by Mr. Thomas Blake.
